Celebrating 35 years of supporting Ryan Place preservation and improvements!

Here are a couple of ideas of how Ryan Place residents have historically prepared their homes to welcome visitors to the neighborhood on tour weekend **Place candles in your windows** For the last 35 years, Ryan Place residents have celebrated tour weekend by putting candoliers, or battery-powered candles with white light bulbs, in our windows. Place as many as you'd like, but most try to have them in all windows that face the street. These can be purchased online on Amazon or in stores like The Home Depot, Target, Dollar Tree or almost anywhere where they sell Christmas lights. Visitors, and Ryan Place residents too, will feel the warmth of the season and a sense of community from seeing our windows aglow. **Decorate your exterior** The home tour is always the first weekend in December. This year, it's Saturday, December 7 and Sunday, December 8. Many tour visitors walk the neighborhood and admire our homes. If possible, consider decorating your exterior for the holidays on the weekend after Thanksgiving so that it can be ready by this first weekend of December. **Consider volunteering** The tour wouldn't be possible without the support of our wonderful neighborhood volunteer docents and other special tour assistants. Online volunteer sign-ups will be available beginning in October. Attend the tour! Visit five beautiful homes all decked out for the holidays, grab a bite from The Beignet Bus on the tour route Saturday from 6-9 p.m., enjoy a light lunch at the Tea Room at St. John's Church either Saturday or Sunday, or (new this year!) have the kids catch a ride on the trackless train Sunday from 1-4 p.m.

### OH, FOR PETE'S SAKE

Saturday morning, September 18, 1954, the Fort Worth Zoo experienced an animal escape – the 18-foot-long, 150 pound Pete the Python 'went missing' from the reptile display. As you can imagine this caused quite a stir at the zoo. It was reported that 100 policemen were dispatched to clear the zoo of the many weekend visitors and to begin the search for the missing snake. A truck drove through the zoo with a loudspeaker blaring, "There's a dangerous snake loose!"

(On the web site – Hometown by Handlebar, Mike Nichols, a former columnist and travel writer for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram writes about the history, culture, and architecture of Fort Worth. His entry: Once Upon a Python: When Pete Went Hither, Slither, and Yon was posted September 18, 2019. I owe his interest and great research for the idea for this column.)

Well, 65 years ago, I was about to turn 10-years-old and living with my Mom, Dad, and little sister at 2616 Lubbock Ave. Very near Lubbock Ave's intersection with W. Robert Street. We lived so close to the zoo that we

would often walk. We would walk along the creek bed that runs north under the Park Hill Bridge through the zoo and to the Clear Fork of the Trinity River. Not a long walk even at the speed of a python.

Then, as you can imagine, a python at-large so close to home was a hot topic around our dinner table. (I kept my legs folded up in my chair during those times just in case Pete got in through our kitchen door.)

Back in 1954 the zoo didn't have an entry charge nor was it surrounded by a high fence. In fact a public street went right through it. You can still see some of that street as you walk through the zoo today. In 1954, only six months before the python's escape, our family had gotten its first television set. No longer would we need to go next door to Mike Blazi's house to watch their TV through the front window. The Star-Telegram had been our main source of news and information, but now Channel 5 brought us daily updates on the search for Pete The Python!

I'm sure I went about my daily routine walking to Alice Carlson Elementary for 5th Grade with my friend Gary Blum from Waits Ave. But now we would not walk through any high grass, and all the while looked carefully at the overhead branches.

Next door to the north, Mrs. Johnson taught piano lessons in her back house. It wasn't quite as warm as the week before, so Mrs. Johnson would be practicing piano pieces with the doors and windows wide open. She wasn't scared of any 18-foot long python, particularly one named Pete. One named Peter or Johann, maybe.

On October 3, the fifteenth morning after the Great Snake Escape, Pete was found less than 100 feet from his home in the zoo's snake enclosure! Some thought that the whole escape story had been a publicity stunt. But that was vehemently denied by the Zoo and George Dolan, the writer at the Star-Telegram who wrote most of the articles.

"Pete the Python" was in the news again when, to everyone's surprise on New Year's Eve, 1957, Pete laid 50 big, white eggs. "He" was quickly renamed Patricial

By 1957 my family had moved out of the TCU area to South Hills. This even though my mother had never wanted to live out past the railroad trestle over Trail Lake Drive! (But that's a story for another time.)

### BY THE NUMBERS

How many homes in Ryan Place? ...there are something over 800 homes in Ryan Place.

Board meeting discussions have included the issues around providing a gentle "facelift" to our petite park at the south end of 5th Avenue and Ryan Place Drive. We have some budget dollars allocated. What now?

#### ABOUT THE DAGGETT PAVILLION:

Also discussed at the last couple of board meetings is the design and accommodations for the pavillion to be built on a portion of the Daggett school playground. Design, decorative trim, electrical and water services are being considered and construction may come very soon!

#### ABOUT THE LANDSCAPING:

At the west end of Elizabeth Boulevard and our entrance gates, are a number of trees and shrubs that may be encroaching on the gates enough to adversely affect the gates. There has been discussion about protecting the gates including possible tree removal or replacement to protect the structure of the stone gates.

#### ABOUT SAFETY and SECURITY:

With the singular criminal event that occurred in May, concern about safety and the security of our homes has become elevated. Discussions have explored possible solutions including a car license tag monitoring system, a window sticker for our cars to know who is a neighbor and who may be just a visitor or more...

Being last-minute, Goodwill-dependent costumers at our house, we'll have to see what actually emerges, but sadly, the days of my kids taking their costume ideas from me are gone. In case you're looking for an idea, though, here are a few books that I think make excellent Halloween costume inspiration.

The Paper Bag Princess, by Robert Munch. This is one I did rope the fam into a few years ago. This classic story's protagonist wears—surprise!—a paper bag for most of the story, and the supplementary costumes of dragon and preppy tennis-playing prince are pretty easy to put together.

The Phantom Tollbooth, by Norman Juster. Characters in this book include Tock, a "watch" dog who sports a giant clock, King Azaz and the Mathemagician, rulers whose royal robes are covered with letters and numbers, respectively, and of course Milo, whose little car would be fun to make out of cardboard. Plus the princesses Rhyme and Reason, the Humbug, and the Which, Faintly Macabre. If you haven't read this book, please check it out for the character names alone!

Roller Girl, by Victoria Jamieson. Who wouldn't want to dress up like a roller derby team? Do you think my moms' group would go for this one?

A Gentleman in Moscow, by Amor Towles. A little bit of a niche choice, but bear with me: while Count Alexander Rostov is imprisoned at the Metropol Hotel, he maintains the highest possible standards of dress, cuisine, and manners, and he attracts to his orbit fallen aristocrats, Communist officials, and glamorous flappers. So many great costume options!

Towles's Rules of Civility, set in New York high society in the 1930s, would also be great dress-up inspiration.

There are so many more! Gatsby! Elephant and Piggie! The Shining! Whatever ends up inspiring your Halloween, have a fun and safe one!





### Build an Emergency Kit...it's worth it

A disaster doesn't take time to plan anything, it just happens. You, on the other hand, can make plans on what you can do if you are an unwilling participant in a major disaster.

#### The Fort Worth Office of **Emergency Management**

recommends all residents build a 72-hour emergency kit for their home and a smaller kit for their vehicle. The home emergency kit should contain essentials for everyday life such as food and water for each family member for three days, plus items to keep you informed and as comfortable as possible under stressful conditions

## Home Kit Contents:

- Canned or boxed nonperishable food items.
- One gallon of water per person per day (for drinking and sanitary purposes).
- Copy of your family's communications plan.
- Flashlights + extra batteries. Extra cellphone battery, charger or power bank.
- NOAA All Hazards Weather Radio + other battery operated AM/FM radio.
- First aid kit with tape & gauze
- Small tool chest with tools to shut off utilities; can opener, pliers & screwdriver, whistle, air horn, flashing lights (to signal for help).
- Blankets, towels; dust mask.

- Medications (minimum one week).
- Requirements for functional needs: formula for infants and pet food, supplies iand a carrier f you own a pet(s).
- Cash & copies of important papers in waterproof baggies such as maps; photocopies of marriage license, birth certificates, insurance, list of prescriptions, contact lists, etc.
- Personal sanitation items: toilet paper, antibacterial cleanser, bucket, plastic bags.

...and the kits are not just for home carry one in your car!

#### Vehicle Kit Contents:

- Flashlight & extra batteries.
- First aid kit.
- Phone charger or power bank Jumper cabled and tire repair kit.
- Non-perishable snacks.
- Bottled water.
- Seasonal items such as blankets, gloves, heavy socks for winter; sunscreen, bug spray and hat for summer.

Choose what you want to place in your kits — it's whatever you believe you will need...and there's no need to buy everything at once; buy what you can - a little at a time. Soon you'll have a complete kit to speed recovery from emergencies
