Put a happy and healthy ending to that story - dispose properly of your no-longer-needed medications.


NOTE: flushing these now toxic chemistries down the toilet is NOT proper disposal - it just shares the misery to our water supply.)

Learn to be a Master Composter

Learn to recycle food scraps and yard trimmings at your home, build healthy soils and reduce water use.

The Master Composter course

will be taught March 21-22 at the Fort Worth Botanic Garden, 3220 Botanic Garden Blvd. Cost is \$40 for Fort Worth residents, \$55 for nonresidents. Scholarships are available to certified elementary, intermediate and high school teachers who are teaching Fort Worth students at an educational institution.

The Master Composter class is part of a citywide program to reduce food waste, decrease dependence on synthetic fertilizers in favor of organic recycling and empower participants to teach others about composting.

Tarrant County Public Health now has testing capability for COVID-19

(NOTE: As of this writing, **there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19** in Tarrant County - or in North Texas.)

Tarrant County Public Health's lab now has the capability to test for COVID-19. Tarrant County joins other labs across the state who now have local testing capability, including Dallas, Houston, El Paso and Lubbock.

"We want to reassure the public that Tarrant County residents will now have access to COVID-19 testing at our public health lab," said Tarrant County Public Health Director Vinny Taneja.

Tarrant County Public Health will now be able to test for the novel coronavirus with same-day or nextday results. Tarrant County has received 800 test kits from the CDC, and more are on the way. Taneja expects the TCPH lab will be able to process 50 to 100 tests per day by next week.

The COVID-19 virus causes respiratory illness with fever and cough and may lead to bronchitis and severe pneumonia.

Symptoms are similar to the flu and include runny nose, headache, cough, sore throat, fever and a general feeling of being unwell. It is similar to the SARS and MERS Coronaviruses. This is more common in people with cardiopulmonary disease and weakened immune systems.



Federal funding announced for TEXRail extension

U.S. Rep Kay Granger has announced that Trinity Metro is authorized to use remaining federal funds from the TEXRail project for an extension of the commuter rail line. The 27-mile route was completed on time and \$80.6 million under budget, with roughly half of those funds coming from federal and half from local.

The \$38.9 million in federal funds can now be used to extend TEXRail another 2.1 miles from the Fort Worth T&P Station to a new station in the Medical District. In 2016, Trinity Metro and the Federal Transit Administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation signed a \$499.39 million Full Funding Grant Agreement for the \$1.034 billion TEXRail project.

The new station will be located behind Baylor Scott & White All Saints Medical Center, by the Mistletoe neighborhood.

Trinity Metro President and CEO Bob

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Baulsir shared his excitement about the expansion. "The Fort Worth Medical District is an ideal location for the next station because of the 40,000 people who work and visit that area. Extending TEXRail is perfect for medical professionals, patients and visitors."

A timeline for the extension has not been determined. Baulsir said the first steps will be to define the scope and to undergo a competitive bid process.

TEXRail began operating in January 2019, and the existing route runs between downtown Fort Worth and Dallas Fort Worth International Airport's Terminal B. The line has nine stations in Fort Worth, North Richland Hills and Grapevine.

Record electricity use expected this summer

The Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) expects record electric use this summer and grid conditions similar to summer 2019.

ERCOT released its final Season Assessment of Resource Adequacy (SARA) for the spring season (March through May) and its preliminary assessment for the summer season (June through September).

As in 2019, the need to declare an energy emergency will depend on

a combination of factors, including demand, wind output and the number of generators on outage on any given day. ERCOT and its market participants are taking steps to ensure system reliability can be maintained during tight conditions.

Declaring an energy emergency allows the grid operator to take advantage of additional resources that are only available under these types of conditions. Additionally, the ERCOT wholesale market is designed to send appropriate price signals to encourage generators to be available when needed, and for customers to lower their energy use.

Total resource capacity for the upcoming summer season is expected to be 82,417 megawatts. The preliminary summer SARA report includes a 76,696-megawatt summer peak load forecast based on normal summer peak weather conditions from 2004-2018. One megawatt typically powers about 200 homes on a summer day.

The final summer SARA report will be released in early May and will reflect the expected summer weather conditions.

Based on the spring SARA report, ERCOT anticipates there will be sufficient generation to meet system-wide demand under a range of extreme system conditions. The spring SARA includes a 64,233-megawatt spring peak load forecast and is unchanged from the preliminary spring SARA.





Words to Inspire

This year, I am asking Near Southside neighbors for their book recommendations.

Cameron Szok is the owner and founder of Southside Acupuncture, PLLC, and a 13-year resident of Ryan Place. She was gracious enough to sit down with me and discuss three books that have had an impact on her practice and life.

Braving the Wilderness, by Brene Brown: Cameron recommends this book about having the courage to be your authentic self. It took some bravery to pursue a less-than-conventional career at age 37, and the book is a helpful reminder to develop her own style and approach to her patients. Brown reminds readers to dare to be who they're meant to be and trust that authenticity will lead to growth and connection.

The Law of Attraction: The Basics of the Teachings of Abraham, by Esther and Jerry Hicks: This book on the power of positive thought builds on Brown's message about developing your own approach in business and life. Cameron notes that Hicks' ideas resonate because the more she focuses on what matters to her, the more she attracts clients and opportunities that reflect her passions.

Fire Child, Water Child: Which ADHD Type does Your Child Have, by Steven Scott Cowan: Cameron doesn't typically treat children in her practice, but recommends this book to parents for its thoughtful approach to ADHD diagnosis through the lens of Chinese medicine as well as for its larger arguments about what motivates children and how to avoid overstimulation in our parenting.

A NEIL DANIEL EDITORIAL - REVISITED

RPIA recently embarked on an effort to collect historic items to include in the Fort Worth Public Library's Archives Collection. The Genealogy, History & Archives Unit has a large collection of family history data including federal census, books, periodicals and online databases. The unit collects primary and secondary materials on the history of Fort Worth, its institutions, organizations, and people.

I received a copy of the October 1990 newsletter containing a report from Mary Jane Ebert, the RPIA's "Foreign Correspondent". At that time she was a Junior at Brown University reporting from the state of Rhode Island. Neil Daniel, then the RPIA Newsletter Editor had encouraged her and other Ryan Place displaced persons to send back reports about their experiences abroad and about Ryan Place from the outside.

From Neil's editorial:

"The benefit of a foreign correspondent is that such a person can look at Ryan Place from the outside. We should be instructed by Mary Jane Ebert's letter from abroad." She reminded us that Ryan Place used to celebrate Christmas before there was 'A Candlelight Christmas in Ryan Place' was devised. She suggested in her report that neighborhoods, like people, grow up, grow older - become different even as they remain the same.

" ... the RPIA was a different organism in its early days when it battled City Hall to keep Fifth and Sixth Avenues from becoming oneway thoroughfares to the hospital district. The Association had a different spirit when the residents got out with shovels and picks to plant

the Italian cypress trees along Eight Avenue a whole decade before they were frozen in the freeze of 1983." (A few of those original cypress trees you can still see today 37 years later!)

"The point I am working around to is that the RPIA still has the needs it has always had, mainly active, energetic residents who care about the neighborhood and will spend the time it takes to keep us alive. I don't want Ryan Place to be exactly the same it was when Mary Jane went to college in 1988. But I want RPIA to have the same basic life."

A neighborhood with residents that care about their neighbors, that is lively as ever, facing the current challenges, thinking of new ways to enrich their neighborhood.

The City of Fort Worth will be expanding its composting pilot program for its employees and residents who work and live downtown by adding a 12th collection site conveniently located at City Hall.

How to navigate spring break traffic

Spring Break week is here again, and that means Fort Worth's cultural attractions will be popular destinations for parents and kids looking to enjoy their time away from school. The following are tips for nearby attractions:

Plan your visit

Spring Break is the most popular time of the year for parents and children to visit the Fort Worth Zoo. Many families will visit on March 11, half-price day. Visitors will be able to access the zoo using their normal route, but more people than usual will be using this route to reach the zoo. Try approaching the zoo from the south by taking Berry Street to University Drive, which is often an easier route, or try taking the University Drive exit from Chisholm Trail Parkway.

Admission to the Fort Worth Zoo is \$16 for adults, \$12 for seniors (65 and over) and children (ages 3-12). Toddlers 2 and

younger are free. Admission is half-price every Wednesday. Zoo hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Take the Safari Express

From March 7-15, Trinity Metro's Safari Express bus will run direct service from Bus Bay A, adjacent to the Trinity Railway Express platform, at Fort Worth Central Station, 1001 Jones St., to and from the Fort Worth Zoo's main entrance at Colonial Parkway.

A round-trip day pass for the Safari Express is \$5 for adults, \$2.50 for children 5-19 and seniors 65 and older (with transit agency ID card), and free for children 4 and under.

The Safari Express will run every 30 minutes from 9:15 a.m. to 6:15 p.m. The first shuttle leaves Central Station at 9:15 a.m. and the last weekday shuttle leaves the zoo at 6:15 pm.

Heading to Dickies Arena for the NCAA Basketball Tournament? Exiting I-30 onto Montgomery Avenue is a great way to get to easy parking at Dickies Arena. If you are coming from downtown Fort Worth, take Lancaster Avenue instead of I-30. Alternately, take The Dash from downtown Fort Worth; buses run every 15 minutes.

Going to Butterflies in the Garden? If you are visiting the Fort Worth Botanic Garden to see Butterflies in the Garden, consider taking Lancaster Avenue to University Drive instead of I-30 to University Drive.


Going to Dream Park? The best option is to use the north entrance of Trinity Park near the duck pond. Visitors from I-30 should exit Henderson Street and take West Seventh Street westbound, then turn south on Stayton Street to enter the park. Follow Trinity Park Drive to Trinity Park court and park in the lot near Dream Park.
