Richard Riccetti is the chairperson of the task

force, and he will present to us and take questions. If anyone has any questions about either one of these matters, please reach out to me directly.

FYI - Mentioning this again!! In case you weren't aware, the neighborhood owns a 1932 fire truck that made appearances for several years in the July 4 parade and other events. We recently had it restored to a functional state and would like to use it for neighborhood events again. However, we need to find a place to store it within a few miles of the neighborhood. Ideally, we would like to find a place for it in Ryan Place. This truck is about the same size of a Ford F250 long bed pickup. If you think you might have an area that would work, please get in touch with me.

RYAN PLACE TREE PROGRAM

The city will provide FREE 5-gallon trees for planting in our parkway - that's the strip of ground between the street curb and sidewalk. Your job is to select the species of trees you want, place your order, dig a hole, and plant the tree. Then, keep the tree watered for the next two to three years until the tree is established. Trees will be available by late March.

A few guidelines for obtaining and planting trees on your location:

- Return the order form (see next page) with your request by March 25.
- Pick up your trees around the end of March.

Follow instructions on locating your tree:

- Must be planted in the parkway
- Dig a proper hole and place the sapling at proper depth
- Plant at least 20 feet from signs, lamps, and street corners
- Protect the young sapling with a stem guard (FREE!) and mulch.
- Maintain water to the young tree for the next two to three years.

How can you help?


- Help us find a storage space!



A Look Back on Eleven Years of My Newsletter Columns, by Christopher Ebert

This was the first. Occasionally in the coming months we will check in with the subjects and issues of 2009-2020.

Ryan Place – A Neighborhood of Historic Proportions

At the leading edge of the baby boomer generation, we moved into the Knox and Evelyn Thomas Home in 1976. Our decision to buy the house was a reaction to the lessons we learned from our parents, whose definition of success was to move away from where you grew up, to move west, to move out of the city center, from urban to more and more suburban environments. We weren't the first wave of young families to discover Ryan Place with its sidewalks, shaded tree-lined streets, neighborhood schools, garbage pickup from the alleys, homes that reminded us of our grandmother's, and neighbors that actually knew each other.

The Ryan Place 4th of July Parade was already a tradition when we got here, and the neighborhood had fought city hall several times with varying degrees of success. Traffic calming along 8th Ave was yet to be accomplished by a combination of Italian Cypress trees and the late afternoon "picket-fence" effect on drivers' windshields as they headed to the suburbs.

When you live in a neighborhood you automatically become a part of its history. You become what President Obama called "part of our patchwork heritage." Our neighborhood patchwork was in part created by the economic cycles and history of Fort Worth and the nation. This patchwork is what makes it possible for young families to rent, buy, and buy again in Ryan Place as their family economics dictate.

Why am I qualified to write a personal history of Ryan Place? (Glad you asked!) Back in the 1980s, I raised my hand at the wrong time and became the newsletter editor; that was when "cut and paste" meant just that. And if you have plenty of storage space available, it is possible to archive old RPIA newsletters, which means plenty of data to write a "Ryan Place – Then and Now" column.

A review of the stories five, 10, 15 years ago, however, reveals that things were pretty much like they are now -- you could just change the names: Councilman Herman Stutte becomes Councilmember Joel Burns; Gas "pot" meters become natural gas wells; Lone Star Gas becomes Chesapeake; 1985 becomes 2009.

I will draw on the written record when it agrees with the points I want to make, interviews with people that have gotten Ryan Place to where it is today will mostly be true (as true as personal histories ever are). Future articles will give you my opinion on stockade fences, protecting set-back requirements on new construction, and some other stuff that will just be fun.

Coming soon: an interview with the Director Emeritus of the Ryan Place Bottom of the Barrel Band, the publisher of several newspapers in Colorado, and the brains (or lack thereof) behind the Labor Day Garage Sale Weekend.

Stay tuned.


AROUND FORT WORTH

Water Bill Assistance

With all the plumbing issues resulting from last month's inclement weather, many of us are seeing significantly higher than usual water bills. Fortunately, Fort Worth is willing to work with homeowners to reduce those bills.

If you had a pipe leak or burst and have had a plumber repair the pipe, contact the city of Fort Worth. You will need to submit an application within 60 days of the completed leak repair and be able to provide a bill from the repair.




