Of the thousands of options out there, here are a few recommendations on exterior lighting products that seem well-reviewed and might be worth checking out:



Paul Koeppe, AIA (1936-2022) A Historic Preservationist!

We became residents of Ryan Place because Mary Beth wanted a house that reminded her of our grandmother's house. It wasn't long after that we became friends with Paul Koeppe. Though not a resident of Ryan Place his work on historic preservation had an important impact on the future of the Ryan Place and Fairmount neighborhoods. He was interested in protecting the architectural history of Fort Worth, probably because both his grandfather and father had been Fort Worth architects. His grandfather, Herman P. Koeppe, was the chief designer for the Wyatt Hedrick architectural firm. That firm designed the T&P Railroad Complex, the Main U.S. Post Office, the 1930 Fort Worth Central Fire Station and the 1938 Fort Worth City Hall/Public Safety Building.

Because Paul's family had been involved with architecture, he knew the history of both Fort Worth and its buildings. Paul also understood the story behind the buildings – who the players were and what was important to them. Both are essential when developing strategies to save and reuse historic structures.

Paul Koeppe was one of the original supporters of the Historic Preservation Movement in Fort Worth. Representing AIA, Paul was an early member of the Historic Preservation Council. The organization of civic and neighborhood groups with interest in historic preservation was established in 1979. I was also a member representing the Ryan Place

Improvement Association.

Paul was the second chairman of the Fort Worth Historical/Cultural Landmarks Commission. For many years Paul maintained an office in the 1930 Fort Worth Public Market Building. Tom Reynolds, the third chairman of the Landmarks Commission, said Paul was a "true friend of historic preservation. A cool head when others got amped up over the foolishness of some actors..."

Paul had many interests most historical. Robert Adams, AIA and Paul went on archeological digs many summers with the Texas Archeological Society. Sleeping on the ground while sharing a "pup tent."

Paul and I collaborated on two contracts with the engineering firm, Freese and Nichols. In the summer of 2010 we documented several buildings of the Fort Worth Holly Water Treatment Plant which were eligible of the National Register of Historic Places. We wrote descriptions, took photographs and wrote histories. In the summer of 2011 we performed the same activities at the Riverside Waste Water Treatment Plant which was soon to be demolished as part of the Trinity River Vision Project.

Quentin McGown, the fourth chair of the Landmarks Commission wrote that Paul's "departure leaves a huge hole in our local architectural community. Few architects could articulate the benefits of historic preservation better." Carol Roark remembers Paul Koeppe "as a gentle soul with a head full of knowledge that he was always willing to share."

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AROUND FORT WORTH

Know a tree with an interesting past? Nominate it for Heritage status

Fort Worth has long promoted urban forestry practices, dating back to 1873 when the city charter declared it illegal to hitch a horse to a tree. The city even hired its first arborist in the 1920s.

So it should come as no surprise that there is an assortment of trees spread throughout the city that are considered significant and are classified as Fort Worth Heritage Trees.

One of those trees, the Turner Oak, is recognized as a Texas Famous Tree. The Texas Forest Service took a core sample and estimated the tree is more than 250 years old.

The Turner Oak has played an important part in the history of Fort Worth. It is named after Charles Turner, one of five men selected to find a location for the camp that was to become Fort Worth. Although opposed to the secession of Texas leading up to the Civil War, he supported the decision of the majority after they voted to side with the Confederacy by organizing a company of men for the war at his own expense. When the Confederacy demanded that citizens exchange their gold for Confederate currency, Turner refused and, with the help of a trusted slave, buried thousands of dollars in gold under a tree growing near the family's home. During Reconstruction following the end of the war, Turner unearthed the gold and used it to pay off debts owed by the firm of Turner and Daggett and stabilized the local economy, allowing the city to get through a financially difficult period.

This is just one of the interesting finds that Hannah Johnson, natural scientist supervisor with the Fort Worth Park & Recreation Department, discovered while updating the Heritage Tree webpage recently.

"The history and significance these trees have to the Fort Worth community is invaluable," Johnson said.

What does it take to become a Heritage Tree?

A tree must be located in the Fort Worth city limits and meet at least one of these criteria:

Possess an unusual size, age, species significance or other characteristic that contributes to its heritage

status.

Be located on a historic site, or contribute to the history of a site.

Serve as a well-known landmark.

Contribute to significant community ties.

Nominations for new Heritage Trees are reviewed annually by an independent panel, and new Heritage Trees are announced at the city's Arbor Day celebration in November.

The Heritage Tree Program helps to foster an appreciation of trees and promotes public awareness that heritage trees are a living and distinct resource for the community. If you know of a tree that meets at least one of the criteria above, take the time to nominate it. The more history and background provided, the better the tree generally scores with the panel.

Browse pictures, locations and learn the history of these magnificent trees on the city's new Heritage Tree webpage. All Heritage Trees posted on the webpage are accessible to the public. You won't find a sign at most of the trees, so be sure to check the map location and cross-reference the photos online to make sure you are at the correct one. Photos of Heritage Trees taken by residents through the years can be emailed to city staff.
